Important facts to know by the end of the Great Fire of London topic:

- The fire started on Sunday 2nd September 1666 and ended Thursday 6th September
- The fire started in a bakery on Pudding Lane and stopped at Pie Corner
- The fire destroyed 13200 homes, St Pauls cathedral 87 churches, and many more buildings
- Only 6 deaths were recorded

Sticky Knowledge about different The Great Fire of London

The Great Fire of London was in 1666, long before your Grandparents were even born

The fire began in a bakery owned by Thomas Farriner in Pudding Lane and lasted 4 days.

The fire was so big and lasted for so long because there had been a 10 month drought, houses were built from wood and very close together, there was a strong wind

To fight fires during this time, people would have used leather buckets, fire hooks and water squirts

We know what happened during the fire because people back then wrote about it in letters and newspapers and art - for instance, Samuel Pepys wrote about it in his diary.

A monument was designed by Christopher Wren to remember the Great Fire of London, he also designed the new St Pauls Cathedral

To stop the fire from spreading King Charles II ordered that houses were blown up and pulled down

King Charles II	The king of London at the time he ordered the army to pull houses down or blow them up to stop the fire spreading
Fire hooks	Metal pole with a hooked end that was used for pulling down houses
Leather bucket	Container of water they used to try to put the fire out
Fire break	An area of land that had plant's, trees and buildings removed to stop the fire from spreading
Water squirt	A hand held water pump
St Pauls	One of the largest churches in the world that
Cathedral	got burnt down in the fire
Monument	A structure of building that is made to remember a person or event
Timeline	The sequence of events that happened in time order
